Local News, Priorities and Useful Information

Road Safety

Motorcycle crashes can be serious. Motorbike riders should realise what they can and can't do and be careful.

Most road crashes can be avoided. They often involve basic mistakes by the rider.

A lot of collisions and deaths in Scotland involve motorbikes.

Motorbike riders are more vulnerable on the roads than car drivers. Weather conditions changing, speeding and poor judgement in overtaking all add to that danger.

There are several things you can do to reduce the risk of crashing:

- Take time on bends on country roads
- Take extra care at junctions
- Take care when overtaking
- Only overtake when it is safe
- Know your motorcycle and what to do if you feel like you are losing control.

Clothing is important for you being seen and for your safety. During the day you should ensure you are wearing bright colours over your protective clothing. In the evening reflective clothing should be worn. A helmet is required by law.

WARNING

It is illegal to ride e-scooters on public land and you must stop immediately



We understand that e-scooters can be considered a fun and convenient way to get around, but the use of e-scooters on public land in Scotland is illegal as they cannot comply with Road Traffic Legislation.

While e-scooters are legally available to purchase, they are mechanically propelled vehicles and it is currently against the law to ride a privately owned e-scooter in any public place in the UK. This includes roads, pavements, parks, town centres or promenades.

People caught riding them could face prosecution and any points issued will be carried over when applying for a full driving licence.





Is your motorcycle a target for thieves?

Motorcycles and scooters are an easy target for thieves but theft does not have to be inevitable, a few simple steps could reduce your chances of becoming a victim.

Security tips when out and about

- Ensure your bike is fitted with a combined alarm and immobiliser
- Fit a tracker
- Attach a combination of chain, disc lock and U-lock. Do not rely on one device, the more security placed on your bike, the less attractive it is to a thief.
 The longer it takes to overcome the security, the more of a deterrent it is
- Try to park under street lights
- When applying your locks, ensure they are secured to a solid anchor point or a permanent piece of street furniture. Keep the lock off the ground where possible as this makes it difficult to cut off.
- Cover your motorcycle and ensure the cover is attached to the security device
- If possible use Thatcham, Sold Secure or Secured By Design approved devices. These have been industry tested and are generally agreed to be amongst the most robust security devices available.
- Ensure you always activate the steering lock
- Do not leave your helmet or other possessions on the motorcycle or in luggage space or panniers.
- Look out for car parks that are accredited to the Parkmark scheme, as they
 are safer places to park vehicles. Log onto parkmark.co.uk for a list of car
 parks on your area
- Be vigilant, ensure that you are not being followed home and check for suspicious items attached to your motorcycle or transporting vehicle/trailer that could be used to track your whereabouts

What can I do to keep safe on a night out?

If you're going on a night out then have fun and enjoy yourself.

Unfortunately, people can be victims of crime. Here are some steps to follow to stay safe:

- Plan your night out and how you will get home
- Take your mobile phone with you and make sure it's fully charged
- Stay with friends and don't leave with strangers
- If you feel very drunk or unwell after a small amount of alcohol then ask a trusted friend or a member of the club / pub management for help
- If you think you have been spiked, report it to the police and seek medical assistance. All reports will be investigated
- Don't take drugs or new psychoactive substances (sometimes misleadingly called 'legal highs')
- Don't have sex with anyone who is too drunk or under the influence of drugs as this means they can't give consent and in Scots Law this is rape
- Look after bags and valuables
- Keep enough money to pay for your journey home
- Use a trusted taxi company that you have used before, or arrange for a friend or family member to collect you
- Stay alert at cash machines, be aware of who's behind you and keep money and your PIN out of view

How do I keep myself safe when meeting new people? Meeting new people through dating sites and speed dating is now very popular. Take care as not everyone will be who they say they are.

There are risks. This includes your immediate personal safety, stalking or harassment or being exploited financially. Here are some steps to follow to stay safe:

- The first time you get together, meet and stay in a busy public place
- Meet in a public place until you feel safe enough to do something different
- Tell someone where you're going, who you're meeting and when you'll be back
- If possible, make arrangements to go with a friend
- Don't accept a lift from someone you have just met even if they seem genuine
- Be alert to hard luck stories, this could be part of a con

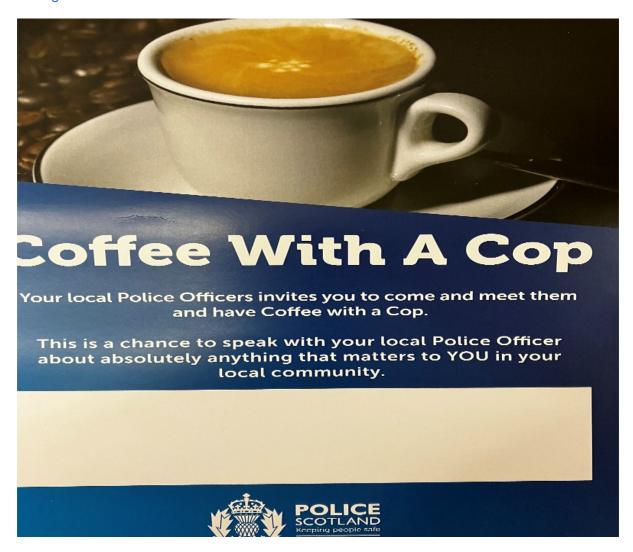
