Local News, Priorities and Useful Information

Road Safety



The community team would like to remind members of the public about the parking restrictions that are placed outside the many schools in the ward area. Parents and carers are respectfully advised to remember that the parking restrictions such as double yellow lines and zig zag markings outside schools are there for the safety of the children attending their local schools. The community team have also been in conversation with the local community as well as our partner agencies regarding improper and dangerous use of E-Scooters. Current legislation on E-Scooters state that such scooters should only be used on **private** land with the landowner's permission. Officers will continue to address these concerns and act where appropriate as the scooters are often used on public roads where children are not wearing helmets or any other protective equipment.

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Advice for drivers during winter:

- Make sure your car is ready for winter
- Check that your tyres, brakes, windscreens, wiper blades and windows are free from defects and clean
- Drive to the road conditions. Road conditions can change without warning, stopping distances will be affected by the weather
- Make sure your windows are clean and aren't misted up
- Make sure there is no snow and ice on your windows before you drive
- When the roads are icy, drive at a slow speed in a high gear
- Accelerate and brake very gently
- Driving distracted (for example, using a Sat Nav) can cause additional stress. It is dangerous to yourself, passengers and other road users.

Cyber Crime

With most of us spending more and more time online, the community team would like to give some advice on how to keep safe online and avoid any online scams.

Social media

Social networking websites and apps are an important part of many people's lives. However, social networking can be used for harmful and/or criminal purposes. Fraudsters can use them to steal people's money so please take some sensible precautions.

Social media is a great way to stay in touch with family, friends and keep up to date on the latest news. However, it's important to know how to manage the security and privacy settings on your accounts. Your personal information shouldn't be seen to anyone but you.

Two-factor authentication (often shortened to 2FA) gives a way of double checking that you really are the person you are claiming to be online. This can be used on social media, banking or email.

Even if someone knows your password, they won't be able to get into any of your accounts that are protected using 2FA.

Understanding your digital footprint

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You should be cautious when using social media. Not everyone using social media is who they say they are.

Take a moment to check if you know the person and if the friend/link/follow is genuine.

You should think about your digital footprint. This is a term used to describe all of the information you post online. This includes photos and status updates.

Criminals can use this information to steal your identity. They can use it to make phishing messages more convincing. You should:

- Think about what you're posting and who has access to it have you changed the privacy options so that it can only be seen to the people you want to see it?
- Consider what your followers and friends need to know
- Consider what detail doesn't need to be there (but could be useful to criminals)
- Have an idea what your friends, colleagues or other contacts say about you online.



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What is Sextortion?

Sextortion can refer to a variety of offences committed online. It is most often used to describe online blackmail, where criminals threaten to release sexual/indecent images of you, unless you pay money or carry out their demands.

Sextortion may be:

- Financial blackmail using sexual / indecent images that have been sent to somebody you've had contact with online
- Financial blackmail using images that have been stolen from you, taken through hacking, or have been faked using AI generators or other image altering technology
- Blackmail using sexual/indecent images that have been sent to somebody but with a
 demand for something other than money. This might be a demand for you to do
 something you don't want to, like give them use of your bank account or provide
 more images.
- What to do if you're a victim of Sextortion

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- If this has happened to you, it is not your fault and there is help and support available.
- **Do not panic** The police will take your case seriously. We will deal with it in confidence. You will not be judged.
- Do not pay Some victims who have paid hear no more about it, others pay and are pressured for more money. In some cases, even when money is paid the criminals share the videos or images anyway. If you've paid the person, consider getting in touch with your bank. They may not be able to recover payments you have authorised, but will be able to help UK Law Enforcement better understand the current threat.
- **Do not talk any further to the criminals** Take screen shots of any communication and offender's profile information. Keep it as evidence.
- Report the incident Report the matter to us by calling 101 and your social media platform website.
- If you are over 18 you can go to <u>Stop NCII</u> (Non-Consensual Intimate Image Abuse) and report it using a free tool which helps to detect and remove intimate images from being shared online.
- If you are under 18 you can go to Report Remove | Childline and confidentially report sexual images and videos of yourself and remove them from the internet.
- Remember that you're the victim of a crime. You're not alone and confidential support is available. You can get through this.
- However, we understand you may find it difficult to report this type of crime to us, so
 it may help you to talk to someone first. Some partner organisations listed below can
 offer you support.
